We are looking forward to seeing the creative and exciting costumes that our students (and staff!) will wear to school on Tuesday, October 31st!

Halloween should and needs to be fun; however, we need to be aware that celebrating Halloween needs to be fun for all. It is important to keep in mind that we need to be sensitive to groups that have been marginalized through mimicry and cultural appropriation during Halloween and other 'dress up' events.



Our teachers will be having discussions with their students about how we can choose our costumes to reflect our **SOAR** acronym

(Safety, Ownership, Acceptance, and Respect). Keep in mind that anything relating to RACE (pretending to look like a different race), CULTURE (using symbols of another culture, indigenous regalia, dreadlocks), RELIGIOUS FAITH (religious leaders, gods, saints, religions, artifacts, clothing related to faith), GENDER (gender switching to make fun), or TRAUMA (nooses, weapons, torture) is not a costume. There are so many other options to choose from! We are on this learning journey together to make our school a safe and inclusive environment for all!
