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GREAT SHAKE OUT EARTHQUAKE DRILL

Along with many organizations across the province, Spul'u'kwuks staff and students participated in the Great Shake Out Earthquake Drill this morning. While potential earthquake hazards depend on your location, everywhere in British Columbia is considered at high risk in relation to the rest of Canada, which is why we practice Drop! Cover! and Hold On! at school. Our school district has

ensured that all schools are well prepared with supplies in case of an earthquake. Each school has a special container outside that holds what we need in case of an extended stay outside after an earthquake. We also perform monthly inspections to ensure safety within the building. Do you have a plan at home? Do you practice Drop! Cover! and Hold On! at home as well as exiting your home? Is there an agreed upon meeting place outside for your family? Do you have earthquake supplies, including food, organized and in an accessible place? Attached to the newsletter is a document that outlines key aspects of earthquake safety you can use at home.



COMMUNICATING STUDENT LEARNING

You may have read that students in K-Grade 9 will not be receiving letter grades and instead will receive a **Proficiency Scale**. You may already be familiar with the scale if your child's teacher participated in the Reporting Pilot over the last number of years.

What is important to note is that the descriptors used in the Proficiency Scales (**Emerging**, **Developing**, **Proficient**, **Extending**) DO NOT relate to letter grades. Letter grades and Performance Scales are not the same, so they cannot be compared.

Students come into every learning situation with their own experiences and background knowledge. A student does not necessarily begin at Emerging or Developing at the beginning of each school year. Similarly, students do not only reach Proficient at the end of the school year. Reaching proficiency is not the end of learning; if a student enters

a learning experience with Proficient understanding or achieves proficiency during the school year, the goal becomes to further enhance their learning.

Benefits of the provincial proficiency scale and descriptive feedback

- Views learning as ongoing, rather than signaling learning is done
- Provides feedback, to both families and students, on where the student is at and how to help them move forward in their learning
- Supports lifelong learning by shifting the focus to developing competencies rather than the achievement of marks
- Maintains high provincial standards by focusing on helping all students attain proficiency in their learning
