Why is it important to be on time for school?

Over the last few weeks, we have noticed that more students are arriving late at school in the morning. This week, we are sharing some long term benefits of being on time and what you can do at home to make it happen! Next week, we will share some tips on overcoming common challenges.

Long-Term Benefits

Future Work Habits

Punctuality is a valuable life skill that translates into the workplace. Developing the habit of being on time during school years helps students build a strong work ethic and reliability, which are crucial for future career success.

Time Management Skills

Being punctual teaches students the importance of time management. They learn to plan and prioritise their activities, ensuring that they can meet deadlines and manage their responsibilities effectively.

Responsibility and Independence

Punctuality encourages students to take responsibility for their actions. It fosters a sense of independence as they learn to manage their time and prepare for school without constant reminders.

Practical Tips for Ensuring Punctuality

Establish a Routine

Create a consistent morning routine that allows sufficient time for all necessary tasks. This includes waking up at the same time every day, having a set breakfast time, and preparing school materials the night before.

Prepare the Night Before

Encourage children to pack their school bags, lay out their clothes, and ensure all homework and assignments are completed before going to bed. This reduces morning rush and ensures a smoother start to the day.

Set a Realistic Bedtime

Adequate sleep is crucial for punctuality. Ensure that children go to bed early enough to get the recommended amount of sleep for their age group. This helps them wake up feeling refreshed and ready for the day.

Use Timers and Alarms

Set multiple alarms or timers to keep the morning on track. This can help remind children of the time and keep them focused on getting ready without unnecessary delays.

Lead by Example

Parents and carers should model punctuality in their daily lives. Demonstrating the importance of being on time for appointments, work, and other commitments reinforces the value of punctuality for children.

Reminder about Kindergarten Registration

We are excited to welcome kindergarten registration applications for children born in 2021, turning 5 in 2026. These children will begin kindergarten in September 2026. Online registration begins November 1, 2025.

Families are encouraged to register any time during the priority 1 registration period (November - January) for the best chance at attending their catchment school. All registration applications completed any time during the priority 1 registration period will receive placement decisions via emails from the school by February 6, 2026.

As per district policy, a student will normally attend the school located in their catchment area in which their parents or legal guardians reside unless there is no physical, resource or program space available. This provision may need to be applied more frequently, potentially resulting in more students needing placement outside their catchment school.
